In this paper I propose the notion of a 'paternal integrate' that constitutes the earliest form of the father in the psyche of the newborn. This concept interprets and extends Winnicott's very late proposal of the father as a whole object from the start of psychic life. Following Winnicott's 'there's no such thing as a baby', André Green suggested that 'there's no such thing as a mother and baby' and proposed the notion of the 'other of the object' in the mother's mind. This essay argues that the 'other' is de facto 'paternal'.

Jan Abram PhD is a Training Analyst and Fellow of the British Psychoanalytical Society in full time private practice in London. She is Visiting Professor of the Psychoanalysis Unit, University College London and Visiting Lecturer in the Adult Department, The Tavistock Clinic.

Between 1989 and 2000 Jan Abram worked for the Squiggle Foundation and her seminal book *The Language of Winnicott: A Dictionary of Winnicott's Use of Words* (1st edition 1996; 2nd edition 2007) was awarded Outstanding Academic Book of the Year in 1997.

Her most recent publication is: *The Clinical Paradigms of Melanie Klein and Donald Winnicott: comparisons and dialogues* that she co-authored with R.D. Hinshelwood. Presently she is preparing a selection of her publications over the past thirty years - *The Surviving Object: Psychoanalytic Essays on Psychic Survival*
